



Amateur Radio Fox Hunting (also known as 'hidden transmitter' or 'radio direction finding') is a popular amateur (ham) radio 'sport' or activity. It is an electronic variation of the 'hide and seek' game. No actual foxes or hounds are involved.

The 'Fox' is a hidden remotely controlled radio transmitter and controller device. The 'Hounds' (licensed amateur radio operators, short wave listeners, their friends and family) use simple radio receivers and home-made directional antennas to find the 'Fox'.

Peel Amateur Radio Group (PARG) Fox Hunts are usually run during Spring, Summer and Autumn in and around the Cities of Rockingham and Mandurah. Although they may venture anywhere within the Town of Kwinana and municipalities of Murray, Serpentine-Jarrahdale, Waroona, and Boddington.
